Food Business Awards 2017

Bistro 309 has been named Glen Eira City Council's Shop of the Year.

Announced at Council's annual Food Business Awards 2017 on Monday I May, the Bentleigh restaurant received the award from Glen Eira Mayor Cr Mary Delahunty for achieving the highest food safety rating after being assessed by Council's environmental health officers during 2016.

Avoca Catering in Ormond was named Shop of the Year Runner-up.

Awards were also presented to local businesses that participated in Council's nutrition and accessibility programs Taste 4 Health, Taste 4 Health Kids and Access 4 All.

Guest speaker at the Awards was celebrity chef Adrian Richardson. Adrian's love of cooking is recognised internationally through his books The Good Life and Meat, and hit television series Ready Steady Cook; Secret Meat Business; and Good Chef Bad Chef. Adrian is also the owner and head chef of La Luna Bistro in Carlton North.

Council's Five-Star Safe Food Program demonstrates our commitment to working in partnership with the local food industry to ensure food is safe for consumers.

To achieve a Five-Star food safety rating, Glen Eira businesses must operate in accordance with Victorian food safety laws; pass Council's food hygiene questionnaire; pass all food sampling results; have no justified complaints within the previous 12 months; and achieve a low-risk rating and a compliance score of 90 per cent or above with National Food Safety Standards.

Cr Delahunty said the program is unique because it offers both financial and promotional incentives for businesses to maintain high standards of cleanliness and hygiene.

'Council rewards those businesses with the best food safety practices through a reduction in Council registration fees, the provision of Five-Star certificates that can be displayed within local businesses, and free publicity in Council's online Safe Food Guide and through its Safe Food Guide iPhone app," Cr Delahunty said.

Elder abuse is any act which causes harm to an older person and is carried out by someone they know and trust.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day is aimed at reminding the community that human rights do not diminish as people get older and that everyone has the right to live with dignity and respect.

The World Health Organisation estimates that up to 10 per cent of older people worldwide are affected.

Figures compiled by the National Ageing Research Institute of Seniors Rights

Victoria indicate that financial abuse and psychological/emotional abuse are together the most common forms of abuse reported by older Victorians.

Warning signs of elder abuse may include an older person seeming fearful, anxious or isolated.

There may be injuries, or an absence of personal care. Disappearance of possessions, unexplained financial transactions, and changes to a will, property title or other documents are also of concern.

Like other forms of family violence, most elder abuse occurs behind closed doors, so it is important for loved ones to watch out for signs, listen and offer help.

Council recognises local volunteers

As part of National Volunteer Week, Glen Eira City Council presented its annual Volunteer Recognition Program Awards at two ceremonies at Town Hall on Wednesday 10 May and Thursday 11 May.

For 27 years, Council has been honouring the countless hours of voluntary service provided by members of the local community.

Certificates of appreciation were presented to 241 volunteers from 54 community groups and organisations.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Mary Delahunty said volunteers drive committees that sustain not only our seniors clubs and sporting clubs, but scouts and guides, environmental groups, playgroups, kindergartens and toy libraries.

"Volunteering also assists organisations to extend their reach and provide support services to community members through telephone helplines and through local health, disability and social services," she said.

"Our community is stronger because of its involvement and Council is delighted

to celebrate volunteers' achievements."

Certificates of appreciation were awarded to 81 people for 500 hours of service; 50 people for 1,000 hours of service; 22 people for 2,000 hours of service; 49 people for 10 years of service; 24 people for 20 years of service; nine people for 30 years of service; and one person for 40 years of service.

Seven volunteers from The National Trust Rippon Lea House and Garden in Elsternwick received a certificate of appreciation for 20 years of service.

Kel and Jill Hobby, Margaret Joseph, and Natalie Bailey work on the estate. They are responsible for ticket and retails sales, events as well as the tearoom and hospitality.

House guides Pam Christensen and Thomas Fitz Gibbon facilitate and conduct 30 to 45 minute tours of the mansion, informing visitors of the social, architectural and inventory history of the mansion.

Sam Teed is a volunteer gardener and assists the garden unit with the maintenance and preservation of the 14 acres that make up Rippon Lea House and Gardens.

Matt Chester from The National Trust Rippon Lea House and Garden said the combined 140 years of volunteering from the seven nominees is an extraordinary effort and this recognition is well-deserved.

Check your heater

Glen Eira residents are urged to check their heating units to ensure they are adequate and safe to use.

If ducts, filters and fans are not cleaned regularly, this can aid the rapid spread of a fire within the house or building or pollute the area with dangerous gases.

It is imperative that the entire system is thoroughly cleaned prior to using your heater.

Gas heaters require servicing every two years to ensure they are not producing carbon monoxide gas. Carbon monoxide is a silent killer — you can't see

Booran Reserve: a new park with a long history

Resting on the ancient ancestral family estates of the Ngaruk Willam clans of the Boonwurrung language people, the newly opened Booran Reserve has a long and unique history.

For nearly a century, the site played an integral role in the development of Melbourne's water network.

In 1857, Melbourne's water distribution network began with a single pipe that led from the Yan Yean Reservoir to the centre of Melbourne. As the population grew, additional storage reservoirs were needed to meet the rising demand. These were connected to Yan Yean by a complex series of pipes, canals and holding reservoirs.

Constructed in 1883, Caulfield Reservoir was one of five service reservoirs built around the same time; the largest at Preston and smaller ones at Essendon, Kew and Surrey Hills. Built for 13,500 pounds and overseen by visionary engineer William Thwaites, it held up to 38 million litres of water and was the first to be built using mass concrete.

Residents of the 'outlying districts' of Caulfield, Brighton and St Kilda eagerly awaited the completion of the reservoir. Relying at first solely on the Yan Yean, water supply was temperamental at best with residents complaining of 'famine' like quantities during summer.

Meanwhile, Melbourne's population continued to boom. In 1891, the Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works was formed and water supply further expanded with the tapping of the Watt's River (near Healesville). Over the next century, a string of additional large-scale reservoirs, conduits and pumping stations were constructed.

The Caulfield Reservoir was

decommissioned in the 1970s. In 2008, Glen Eira City Council began to advocate to the State Government to manage the land as public open space. Council was formally appointed Committee of Management in 2010. Development of plans for the reserve included three community consultations periods where feedback from the community helped shape the vision for the space. Works on-site commenced in September 2014.

Formally opened on Tuesday II April 2017, a new chapter has now been added to the site's long history. Booran Reserve features a range of spaces for play, activity and relaxation — providing something for everyone.

The theme of water has been incorporated into many of the new park features, such as the tunnel pipe, water play area and flowing pathways. Elements of the old reservoir can be seen in sections of the wall, bluestone plinths, old water valves have been upcycled as sculptural pieces and the central 'sluice gate' structure, which was used to control water levels, has been transformed into an area for relaxation and respite.

Interpretive panels on the sluice gate and art panels around the park tell both the indigenous story and the site's history as a reservoir.

The park also feature a range of sustainable measures, including a 500,000 litre rainwater tank, solar panels, LED lighting and rain swales that capture water on-site. During construction, 99 per cent of the old reservoir was re-used, with concrete walls and embankments crushed and used as fill on-site.

Glen Eira's newest park now provides a public open space which can be enjoyed by all. The redeveloped reserve ensures this site continues to tell the story of its role in Melbourne's water history.

Simple energy saving tips for winter

On average, Victorian households spend around \$800 a year on home heating around one third of the total energy bill. With winter now upon us, it's worth considering some simple, cost-effective tips to help improve the winter energy efficiency in your home.

Before turning to the heater, the most efficient way to stay warm inside your home is to start with an extra layer of clothing. A warm jumper, wrap, scarf, beanie or slippers that you love can be a wonderful investment for winter.

Curtains can also be very effective at keeping warm in winter. Keep them open during the day to catch the warmth from the sun, and close them at night to keep the heat in. Ideally, your curtains should be close-fitting, headed with a pelmet and hang all the way to the floor, sealing in all of that welcome warmth.

It can be tempting to crank the temperature right up when you turn a heater on and then turn it off or down later, but it is much better to set the thermostat at 18 to 20 degrees from the word go. Every degree higher on your thermostat can increase your bill by up to 10 per cent. Draught-proofing your home to make sure you are not losing heat or allowing the cold in through cracks and gaps in and under doors, walls and windows is a relatively cheap way to save on energy and bills.

World Oceans Day — 8 June

Our Ocean Our Future is the theme for World Oceans Day.

To be celebrated around the world on 8 June, we all have a part to play in keeping our waterways clean and preventing litter, especially plastics, entering our oceans.

Glen Eira City Council manages approximately 540 kilometres of drains and is responsible for looking after the local stormwater system.

The system is designed to take rainwater from streets into the closest waterway. Litter dropped in our streets is often washed into the stormwater system when it rains, flowing directly into Elster Creek, and then eventually making its way into Port Phillip Bay.

Council works to reduce pollutants entering the stormwater system in a variety of ways, including our street sweeping services and in the design of infrastructure.

For example, the recently completed redevelopment at Booran Reserve has a number of bio-swales which capture and treat water on-site. Bio-swales reduce litter and pollution entering stormwater by naturally filtering the water through garden beds. Sedges and rushes assist in stripping harmful nutrients from the stormwater before they enter our waterways.

You can play your part by:

through Council's kerbside collection service and options available through other organisations.

Beyond Council services, there are more options becoming available for recycling a wide range of materials.

For example, if you haveworn out towels, bedding sheets or pillow cases taking up space in your cupboards, the Burwood RSPCA would love to take them off your hands.

You might even have a bicycle in working order or that is easily fixable that you no longer need. You can take it to items that cannot be recycled.

Woodwork provides children with the opportunity to build things, whilst developing and practicing a wide range of skills.

Participating in woodwork can help children to improve hand-eye co-ordination, learn how to problem solve and learn to share and co-operate with others.

Carnegie Early Learning Centre offers a wide variety of experiences for children, including woodwork.

As part of the day-to-day curriculum at the Centre, children have access to wood, hammer and nails. Children work independently, as well as in groups, learning new ways to express their creativity.

Children in the three to five-year-old room recently put their skills to good use at the Little Woodworkers incursion.

Carnegie Early Learning Centre Team Leader Lyn Cramp said the children learnt about where wood comes from and what wood means to us in the world we live, what grows on trees, and the types of different wildlife that live in trees. "The children were also shown a range of tools used when making an item out of wood, learnt about the safety rules and why they should wear safety glasses and the importance of listening to instructions," Mrs Cramp said.

Following a demonstration, the children used their cognitive and problem-solving skills and spatial awareness to create their masterpiece — a toy plane.

"The children used dowel and mallet to put the wheels on the plane, then screws and the battery drill to put the wings and the propeller," Ms Cramp said.

"If the children wanted to build something they had an idea for, they were able to use scrap wood and dowel to make anything they wanted —boats, horses and turtles were a popular choice."

Be responsible — pet care

Owning a pet can be a very rewarding experience that can provide you with many years of fun and companionship.

To adequately care for your pet and to ensure the impact on the community is limited to positive experiences, you should desex, register and microchip your pets.

Desexing

The benefits of desexing include:

- it helps to reduce over-population (especially in cats);
- pets are less prone to wander or fight;
- territorial behaviours such as spraying indoors are reduced; and
- pets are less likely to suffer from antisocial behaviours — they can become more affectionate and better companions.

Microchipping

State Government legislation requires all cats and dogs being registered with a council for the first time must be microchipped prior to registration.

Microchipping is the most effective way to identify your pet and assist Council to reunite you with your pet. It provides long-term benefits for both Council and residents.

Registering

460 years of volunteering recognised

Boyd Park history



Boyd Park in Murrumbeena forms part of the Outer Circle Railway land. The railway was completed in 1891, running in three sections from Oakleigh to Fairfield Park and ceased operation by 1897. After closure, sections of land surrounding the railway link (now Boyd Park and surrounds) were fenced off and leased for the agistment of horses.

While the land was not officially public parkland, it was frequented by community members for recreation activities such as bike riding, bonfires, fishing and canoeing in the creek. Murrumbeena Creek flowed under Dandenong Road and frequently flooded during heavy rainfall. The land remained as an unkempt paddock until 1960, when a local resident group formed, with intentions of beautifying the area. During the mid-1960s, Glen Eira City Council took over the maintenance of the park.

Following the announcement by the Premier in February 1988 of the creation of the Outer Circle Linear Park between Kew and Caulfield, residents proposed that part of the park within Caulfield be named Boyd Park.

This was to honour the family of talented painters, writers and musicians, one branch of who lived and worked close to the parkland.

Boyd Park now features a shared pathway and is a key transport route for cyclists. The reserve also features a playground, open spaces, urban forest and rotunda. It's a great place for a family picnic.

Expressions of interest are now being sought for the 2017 Glen Eira City Council BusEd Program IT projects with Monash and Swinburne universities.

Developing a new website can be a daunting task for small businesses. Often this important element of a business is put off due to business owners feeling out of their depth, or because of the high costs of developing a more customised business tool.

Council's *BusEd Program* provides Glen Eira businesses with the opportunity to work with IT students from Swinburne and Monash University to develop customised websites, software and databases to support their business. Through these projects, students have the opportunity to apply their knowledge to a real business challenge and work with a real client.

As there is no charge to the business, participation in this *Program* can potentially save thousands of dollars in development costs. These projects however are a collaborative effort between clients and students, and business owners must be willing to commit the necessary time to gain the best possible outcome.

Projects take between three to eight months to complete depending on complexity, and clients are required to meet regularly with their team of students, and provide them with information and feedback throughout the project.

There are a variety of outcomes that can be achieved from successful projects, including systems that enable businesses to create new channels for interacting with customers; sell their products online; and/or streamline their information management and business processes.

The following case study — featuring a Swinburne project — illustrates the outcomes that can be achieved.

Since 2009, Mookey Grinberg has been running his Elsternwck party supplies retail business Party Bazaar. Mookey was keen to upgrade his dated website to help improve his competitive edge in this challenging retail climate.

Mookey was drawn to the *Program*, not only because of the obvious appeal of saving development costs, but also



because he was keen to seek input from young minds.

Mookey has been very impressed with his student team.

"The students are amazing," Mookey said.

"They are very open to listening and understanding my business needs, and have put forward some very creative ideas.

"The new website will have a fresh modern look and integrate all my social media. I believe this will help open new avenues for my business.

"Even though I am very busy running the store, I have found it very beneficial to work closely with the students. They are very patient with me and their professionalism has made the project run very smoothly. I highly recommend this program to other business owners."

Apply and pay online for Town Planning services

From Tuesday 30 May, customers will be able to apply and pay for the following services via Council's website — www.gleneira.vic.gov.au/ planning-online

Planning information request

This service is available to customers who require written confirmation of a specific site. For example, somebody may want confirmation that they need a planning permit in writing.

Search and copy

This service assists customers who require a copy of a planning permit or plans. This includes a historical search of permits.

Extension of time

This form is used where a planning permit is due to expire. If the applicant wants to act on a permit, and for various reasons may not be able to commence on time, they can request an extension to their permit.

Town Planning already has an existing suite of online services, including

- free pre-application advice;
- viewing applications which are on public notice; and
- submitting online objections.

This work plan has been divided into eight stages, and we encourage you to have your say at each stage to ensure our projects are created for the community, by the community.



Glen Eira is forecast to grow by 22,000 people, 9,000 dwellings and 9,500 jobs over the next 15 years. The draft *Activity Centre, Housing and Local Economy Strategy* aims to set a new 15 year City vision for the future of Glen Eira.

It is evident that Glen Eira is undergoing an exciting time of transition, and we now have the opportunity to set a new direction for our municipality. Our City is recognised as a municipality with wonderful amenity, a diverse community with a considerably high number of well connected activity centres.

Activity centres are areas that range in size, but usually include both the commercial heart and nearby surrounding residential area. They provide a focus for housing, commercial, retail, community, employment, transport, leisure, open space, entertainment and are places where people shop, work, meet, relax and live.

The draft *Strategy* has been informed by extensive community feedback, expert analysis, as well as a review of trends occurring across metropolitan Melbourne.

We have incorporated feedback received through: the *Planning Scheme Review 2016* (approximately 260 responses); the *Tell us what you love about your shopping strip Survey* (approximately 2,100 responses); the *Transforming our neighbourhoods Survey* (approximately 1,000 responses); and the *Glen Eira Draft Council and Community Plan* consultation.

THEME ONE: PLACE-MAKING Well connected and distinctive neighbourhoods

What we heard from recent community engagement:


- Create places for people that are >vibrant and have a greater focus on family and vibrancy within our centres.
- Cleaner, greener and better connected >centres that are easily accessible for all members of the community.
- >The identity of each of Glen Eira's neighbourhoods need to be strengthened and a greater emphasis needs to be placed on making these centres family friendly.
- Improve car parking conditions and decrease traffic congestion in activity centres.

Glen Eira is made up of a number of distinct neighbourhoods that each have their own unique identity. The individuality of each place is a contribution of many factors, including the buildings, public spaces, community services, people and culture of the area.

As our local centres become more affected by globalised and mobilised markets, it becomes more and more important to create community rich experiences within these centres that cannot be bought online.

Accessibility of our centres is also a high priority to ensure services and experiences are easily available to the community, particularly by foot and bicycle.

Developing a clear neighbourhood identity will reinforce the community bond and improve social wellbeing and inclusiveness. This will result in a strong, supported local economy that reflects the needs of the community.



OBJECTIVES

I.I Culturally rich communities

Glen Eira's neighbourhoods have long and layered histories, which are reflected in many heritage listed buildings and streetscapes.

Glen Eira is a proudly multicultural municipality that is made up of a range of ethnicities, including Indian, Chinese, Greek and Israeli communities. Glen Eira is also home to one of Australia's largest Jewish communities, with 18.9 per cent of our population identifying as Jewish (compared to 1.1 per cent across greater Melbourne). Our diversity should be celebrated and enhanced through local activities that build on these unique neighbourhoods.

Our activity centres will be culturally rich places, reflecting the unique characteristics and aspirations of their local neighbourhood.

1.2 Create places for people

Our neighbourhoods should be centred around a shopping strip that not only provides for the shopping needs of the surrounding residential areas, but also provides spaces and enjoyment for the community, including green spaces.

Glen Eira has the lowest amount of open space as a proportion of land area available and per person. Parks, gardens and public spaces enhance our centres by providing the community with meeting points and areas of enjoyment that are accessible by all members of the community.

We will continue to create open spaces that contribute to the recreational, physical and social needs of all community members.

1.3 Connected neighbourhoods

Car parking and traffic congestion is a common concern for the Glen Eira community. The State Government has recently invested more than \$2 billion into Glen Eira to facilitate the removal of seven level crossings, rebuild six train stations and construct approximately 3.8 kilometres of elevated rail and new open space.

We need to ensure that population growth is supported by a range of sustainable travel choices that reduce car dependency, including walking; cycling; motor cycling; and public transport. Simultaneously, a strategic approach needs to be taken to mitigate car parking and traffic issues.

1.4 Better quality and greener streetscapes

Our streetscape and public realm are a major contributor to the identity of a neighbourhood. Our centres should be clean and attractive, and they should promote active transport options, particularly walking.

We must improve the walkability of our neighbourhoods by increasing pedestrianisation of our centres and ensuring safe and convenient access for all members of the community.

THEME TWO: LOCAL ECONOMY VIBRANT ACTIVITY CENTRES WITH A THRIVING LOCAL ECONOMY

What we heard from our recent community engagement:

- A high proportion of residents (85 per cent) indicated that they were either satisfied or very satisfied with the current weekly food shopping options in their local area.
 A similar number were satisfied with the local specialty food on offer.
- > The community members want their local centres to have a vibrant nightlife.
- Our centres should provide experiences, not just transactions.

A strong focus of the draft *Strategy* is to ensure our community is provided with adequate employment opportunities within close proximity to their homes, as currently 80 per cent of Glen Eira residents commute outside our City for work.

The principle for the 20 minute neighbourhood outlined in both the *Glen Eira Draft Council and Community Plan* and *Plan Melbourne* aims to create accessible, safe and attractive local areas where people can reach employment, services and infrastructure within a 20 minute walk, cycle or local public transport trip.

The new jobs framework outlines how future job opportunities can be provided for our local community by reviewing the planning requirements for well designed and located building developments across our City.

OBJECTIVES

2.1 More local jobs — less commuting

Plan Melbourne estimates that there will be an additional 60,000 jobs required within Melbourne's inner south east region within the period of 2015 to 2031, representing an annual growth rate of 1.3 per cent per annum. Key industries supporting this growth will be retail trade; healthcare and social assistance; professional, scientific and technical services; and education and training.

By 2036, the total number of working residents in Glen Eira will increase by 21 per cent from 70,030 to 84,980. The professional, scientific and technical services and financial and insurance services sectors are together expected to account for 34 per cent of this growth, with the healthcare and social assistance sector accounting for a further 24 per cent. To ensure residents do not need to commute to the CBD for work, more jobs need to be provided within Glen Eira, particularly within these growing industries.

There is opportunity to co-locate employment opportunities for professional industries within designated nodes to strengthen Glen Eira's competitive and innovative capacity. Greater employment options should also be encouraged that cater to the employment demands of the community.

It is important that Glen Eira's activity centres are great places to visit, with shops and services providing human experiences that cannot be found online.

We will have a strong focus on place-making and will continually adapt to the changing economy to ensure our municipality is vibrant, prosperous and sustainable, and that the aspirations of our community are met.

2.3 Strengthen the heart of the community

As the community grows, so does its need for infrastructure, including community services, schools, open space and cultural events.

In our major activity centres, libraries provide a great anchor of community life. Libraries are also departing from the traditional quiet place to borrow books, and are more recently emerging as community hubs with more people depending on these spaces for social interaction and co-working spaces.

Glen Eira's library programs are the fifth highest attended across 47 libraries within the *Public Libraries Victoria Network (PLVN)*. It is expected that in 2036 our growing population will generate almost 154,000 additional library visits per year.

We must reduce the negative impacts of commuting by improving the numbers of local jobs in our City, in particular through the creation of new office space for professional employment.

2.2 Foster human experiences

In terms of the retail sector, changes are occurring due to a number of different factors, including demographic changes; the global financial crisis; recent level crossing removals; and the movement towards a digital economy. New and innovative ways to conduct business are constantly being created, such as the introduction of online shopping, which leads to a reduction in the need for physical retail space.

These changes lead to a shift in the composition of our shopping strips with more opportunities arising for physical experiences and less for mere transactions, such as an increase in the number of cafes and restaurants or the introduction of co-working office spaces.

Our activity centres will become the centre of community life, thanks to contemporary well-placed and well-serviced community hubs and libraries.

2.4 Vibrant nightlife and weekends

A total of 2,178 businesses in Glen Eira are located at ground floor in activity centres, 34 per cent of which are in Carnegie, Bentleigh and Elsternwick. Only a small percentage of stores are open after dark.

Hospitality related activities, such as cafes and restaurants, represent the biggest driver for night-time and weekend activity. They also represent an increasing amount of floorspace (approximately 64,000 square metres). Together with takeaway food outlets, they account for 32 per cent of total floorspace within all activity centres.

We must proactively foster our centres as vibrant nightlife and weekend destinations through the creation of additional floorspace designated to hospitality uses.

THEME THREE: HOUSING QUALITY HOUSING AND BUILDINGS FOR THE FUTURE

What we heard through our recent community engagement:


- Our community want new buildings >to be of quality design and responsive to their immediate context.
- >Our community want new buildings to respect the character of the area.
- The environment is of growing > concern and we must act now to minimise our impacts for the future.

Demand for new housing is due to population growth, but also to the changing housing needs of the community with strong links between life cycle events as families grow, shrink, disperse and age. When considering Glen Eira's future housing and development needs, it is important to understand the different needs of our community, the different stages of a life cycle and the appropriate household types.

The new housing framework will guide the type of household required in the future to accommodate our community's needs. There is a particular focus on providing well-located medium density family housing; age-friendly housing; safe single households; and affordable housing that meets the needs of our community's most vulnerable. This framework will guide future precinct structure planning, local policy and building design guidelines.

This housing framework seeks to further develop our existing housing strategy by providing more guidance on household types to be accommodated within our major and neighbourhood centre catchments.

OBJECTIVES

3.1 Provide housing for all

It is likely that by 2031, an additional 9,000 dwellings will be required within Glen Eira. These additional dwellings should be best considered as 'homes' that are proactively planned for to address the future needs of the community.

Young family households are the fastest growing household in Glen Eira, increasing by 22.6 per cent between 2001 and 2011. The established family home is therefore in high demand, and new apartment developments are limited in the range of household types that they attract.

By prioritising a greater supply of medium density three-bedroom townhouses, a range of household types can be accommodated, including young families.

We must plan for the housing needs of the community and ensure that diverse housing options are made available to accommodate all situations and aspirations.

3.2 Respect amenity and local character

Council's existing, long standing policies closely link housing growth with our activity centre hierarchy. Although we must accommodate an increase in our population, a centre that is of a higher order can not necessarily accommodate large scale buildings.

Housing capacity and building scale can be separated from activity centre hierarchy by clearly identifying housing typologies that can accommodate growth in strategic locations that respond to their immediate context and neighbourhood character, and also reduce impacts on amenity.

We must plan for the right development in appropriate locations by encouraging buildings that respond to their immediate urban context.

3.3 Plan for the future housing needs of the community

Population increases lead to increased development pressure, especially considering that Plan Melbourne directs 70 per cent of housing growth to occur within our established suburbs.

To ensure that development does not unreasonably impact on our community's amenity, we must plan for growth by identifying areas that are suitable for development and ensuring the type of development that occurs is respectful of the area.

We must proactively plan for change by considering the future needs of the community.

3.4 Build a sustainable future

Plan Melbourne states that energy use in buildings accounts for around a quarter of Australia's greenhouse gas emissions. By implementing sustainable development initiatives, we can attempt to mitigate the effect our increased population has on the environment for the benefit of the future Glen Eira community.

We must demonstrate a clear focus on environmental sustainability.
