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BACKGROUND

- ➤ The Glen Eira Community Plan is the framework and key planning document for work to be undertaken by Glen Eira City Council (Council) on behalf of the community from 2017-2021. It reflects the community's priorities and directions as stated during consultations with residents, Council staff, and groups that work with Council. As a community leader, Council works to protect the unique characteristics that attract people to Glen Eira.
- ➤ The document will be used as a guide for decision making, resource allocation and organisational focus. The Plan details the priorities that Council will pursue to meet the needs of the Glen Eira community.
- ➤ The Plan includes strategies and actions to ensure Council is transparent and accountable for the resources used for these purposes. A community plan is a living document that is reviewed and reported on each year in Council's Annual Report. It also provides a strategic overview of Council's proposed priorities in coming years, putting boundaries around core activities within the range of work that Council is called on to perform.
- > The Community Plan is developed in consultation with Glen Eira residents to ensure it is reflective of community aspirations and needs. A steering committee, comprising both councillors and community representatives, was formed in 2012 to guide the development of the next iteration of the Plan.

RESEARCH OBJECTIVES

- ➤ Before it can proceed with the development of a new Community/Council Plan, the City of Glen Eira needs to consult with residents and councillors alike to identify, assess and understand community interests, needs and priorities for the City of Glen Eira.
- The Community/Council Plan in essence, is a reflection of what Glen Eira residents see as being the most important considerations for the area in the coming years.
- Research results will provide an understanding of residents' needs and aspirations for the community, including analysis by different subgroups within the community such as various demographic, geographic and resident groups.
- More specifically, the research assesses the following:
 - What Glen Eira residents perceive to be the most pressing needs for the community.
 - The aspirations Glen Eira residents have for their community.
 - Profile of which residents hold which interests, and in what location.
 - The expectations Glen Eira residents have of the Council over the next four years.

METHODOLOGY AT A GLANCE

- ➤ To fully explore community needs and aspirations for the 2017-2021 Community Plan, JWS Research adopted a combined qualitative and quantitative research approach to investigate community perceptions and information needs.
- Qualitative research in the form of <u>focus groups</u> was conducted first to identify and explore attitudes in depth, and to provide input into the quantitative phase.
- The second phase of fieldwork comprised a <u>telephone survey</u> to validate and quantify opinions.

Community Opinion Research

Qualitative research: Focus groups

- 6 x focus groups
- 6-9 participants in each group
- 2 groups each from Camden, Rosstown and Tucker wards


Quantitative research: General community survey

 Telephone survey among n=500 Glen Eira residents aged 18+

QUALITATIVE RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

- ➢ Six focus group discussions were held between 13th − 18th July 2016.
- Participants were recruited by age, gender and area of residence, and included a mix of both ratepayers and non-ratepayers.
- Two groups, one 'older' and one 'younger', from each of Glen Eira's three wards were conducted, as follows:

QUANTITATIVE RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

Fieldwork comprised a 12 minute telephone survey, conducted between 1st – 8th August 2016.

Representative sample of n=500 Glen Eira residents aged 18+ years, including a mix of ratepayers and non-ratepayers.

Survey quotas on age, gender and location were implemented, as well as post-weighting to ABS population distribution to ensure accurate representation.

The maximum margin of error on a sample of 500 interviews is +/-4% at the 95% confidence level for results around 50%. Differences of +/-1% are due to rounding.

This research was conducted in compliance with AS-ISO 20252.

QUESTIONNAIRE STRUCTURE

The questionnaire was structured as follows:

Screening questions (incl. gender, age, suburb and postcode)

- Q1. Overall quality of life in Glen Eira
- Q2. Importance of issues for the future of Glen Eira
- Q3. Awareness of the Community Plan
- Q4. Clarity of responsibility of services by different levels of government
- Q5. Importance of issues on which Glen Eira Council can advocate to State or Federal Government
- Q6. Importance of Community Plan themes to the future of Glen Eira
- Q7. Communication sources most likely to take notice of

Demographic questions (own or rent, time lived in Glen Eira area)

NOTE TO READER: Throughout the report, where there are significant differences between subsamples (at the 95% confidence level) these have been highlighted, and marked in blue or red as follows:




SNAPSHOT OF KEY FINDINGS AND IMPLICATIONS



The findings suggest there is **opportunity to increase awareness of the Community Plan** as the majority of residents are not aware of its existence. Increasing awareness will enable a greater level of engagement with the plan formation process and ultimately with the Plan itself.





- Development
- Traffic congestion and parking
- · Community consultation and engagement

These are the issues that are most important to residents and that they want to see covered in the 2017-2021 Community Plan.



When tested against current Community Plan themes, **Security and Safety** is seen to be the most important to the future of Glen Eira. There is evidence to suggest that this could be included as a **standalone theme in the upcoming Community Plan**.



There is confusion amongst residents as to which levels of government are responsible for what services and amenities. Providing clarification will arm residents with the knowledge of what Council is responsible for and what they can advocate to higher levels of government on. This will clarify Council responsibilities and expectations.



- More than nine in ten (93%) Glen Eira residents describe their quality of life to be at least 'good, with a majority (51%) of residents indicating it is 'very good'.
- With most residents living well, things that are perceived to need improving centre around issues that are perceived to be, or have the potential, to detract from residents' high quality of life. These involve concerns relating to overdevelopment, parking, traffic congestion and safety.
- On a prompted basis, the most important issues for the future of Glen Eira are:
 - Security and public safety (78% 'very important')
 - Council transparency and accountability (78% 'very important')
 - Protection from overdevelopment and/or inappropriate development (71% 'very important')
 - Traffic congestion issues (70% 'very important')
 - Provision of parking for new developments (70% 'very important')
- These results are in-line with the qualitative findings, and highlight a need for Council to address these issues prominently in the upcoming Community Plan.

- The majority of residents (71%) are unaware of the current Community Plan. This suggests there is scope to raise awareness of the next Community Plan amongst Glen Eira residents. Increasing awareness is a key first step towards greater engagement with the plan process and with the plan itself.
- Findings throughout the research program strongly indicate that **Security and Safety is an important area/theme** that residents are seeking Council to address and communicate more so than other areas/themes currently addressed by the Community Plan. Given its clear importance to local residents, **the research findings strongly suggest Security and Safety be directly addressed in future Community Plans.**
- When tested against current Community Plan themes on a forced choice basis, **residents view**Security and Safety as the most important to Glen Eira's future. Thirty percent (30%) of the Glen Eira population rate this theme as most important, followed by Town Planning and Development (20%), Traffic, Parking and Transport (18%) and Services to Support the Community (12%).
- > The rating of Security and Safety as the most important theme for the future of Glen Eira is consistent across all demographics, with those who rent (44%) and Tucker ward residents (34%) rating it the highest.


- The qualitative research provides insights into ways Council could improve the way it presents information in the Community Plan. For instance, simplifying language and making text more concise, and thinking about how to make the Community Plan easy to read and engage with. The content of what is covered in the Plan is met with positive reactions, but Glen Eira residents are seeking a more streamlined presentation to give as broad a cross-section of people in the community the opportunity to effectively absorb the information presented.
- Ideally, residents want the Community Plan to be measurable, with detailed goals and timeframes for projects.
 - The inclusion of some kind of key performance indicators (KPI's), are seen as important to increasing measurability and accountability of Council to residents. For instance, Council could consider ways to report back progress on areas addressed in the Community Plan, as this will aid in improving the relationship between residents and Council by demonstrating a willingness to be accountable.
- Residents would also like to see more detail on specific projects, such as:
 - Outline of current and future projects
 - More location specificity
 - Specific allocation of budget
 - Detailed objectives and targets

- Incorporating aspects of and increasing the awareness of Council's yearly Action Plan will provide residents with the project detail they are seeking and thus allow for a deeper engagement with the Community Plan.
- Research findings suggest that there is confusion amongst the community as to which services Council is responsible for, and what is the responsibility of other levels of government. Residents are seeking clarity on this issue and want to see a clear outline of what Council is advocating on to higher levels of government in the next Community Plan.
- Misunderstanding and over-responsibility for services results in blaming of all levels of government regardless. Outlining the services for which Council is responsible will provide residents with an understanding of what to expect from Council across the various service areas (responsibility or advocacy).
- Paper-based channels dominate resident preferences for how Council communicates with them about the Community Plan. Seven in 10 people (71%) say they are most likely to take notice of Council newsletters or information sent by mail, whilst half (50%) of residents indicate that are likely to take notice of advertising in the paper version of the local Leader newspaper. Communicating to residents regarding the Community Plan through these channels is most likely to increase awareness and engagement in the community.





THE VAST MAJORITY OF GLEN EIRA RESIDENTS CONSIDER THEY HAVE A 'GOOD' QUALITY OF LIFE



HOW TO READ A WORD CLOUD

- People in our focus groups were asked to outline some good things about living in Glen Eira, as well as some not so good things or things that need improving in Glen Eira. Their responses have been transcribed and put into word clouds on the following slides.
- The size of the word in the word cloud reflects the frequency of which the word was mentioned by participants across all groups. Smaller words were also talked about by people in our groups, however these words were not mentioned as frequently as larger ones.



"GOOD THINGS" ABOUT LIVING IN GLEN EIRA



- ➤ Glen Eira residents are proud of their communities. People express immense satisfaction with parks, quality of schools, location and the multicultural make-up of their communities.
- Transport options are seen to be good and the family friendly nature of neighbourhoods is highly valued.

THINGS THAT NEED IMPROVING IN GLEN EIRA



- No place is perfect however. Whilst residents are generally happy, their concerns generally relate to their future quality of life.
- Overdevelopment is seen to be a big issue and this is creating problems such as traffic, parking and over-crowding in schools – all things that residents see as getting worse.

PERCEIVED OVERDEVELOPMENT IS A PRIMARY ISSUE AND A KEY AREA RESIDENTS WISH THEY COULD CHANGE

When group participants were asked to nominate one thing they would change about the City of Glen Eira, a range of issues, big and small, were voiced.

Perceived inappropriate development is the most common concern among residents. Residents view development as detracting from their overall quality of life as it is creating wider problems such as traffic and parking congestion and loss of neighbourhood character. People articulate a desire for Council to 'curb' this issue through tighter restrictions on new multi-dwelling buildings.

"Stop the overdevelopment. It's just getting too big and too cumbersome and just has flow on effects and problems with traffic and parking. For each 2 bedroom unit it's got 1 car spot." (Camden Ward, Older)

"A policy on housing density – controlling it. It's affecting amenity, parking, privacy. Congested parking – it's because every property that gets knocked down becomes 3 or 4." (Rosstown Ward, Older)

"Restricting development of larger apartment blocks – knocking down the lovely houses is changing the look of the area." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)

CONFUSION OVER RESPONSIBILITIES IMPACTS CHANGES SOUGHT BY THE COMMUNITY

The group discussions highlighted **existing confusion** amongst residents over what services and amenities **Council is responsible for** and the services and amenities **that higher levels of government are responsible for**.

Changes to the City of Glen Eira as outlined by residents fall under two categories:

- **Direct responsibility** areas that come under council's guise that they are directly responsible for.
- Advocacy areas that Council is <u>not</u> directly responsible for but can advocate on to higher levels of government.

The changes highlighted on the following slide show the interchangeable nature of the perceived problems. Residents struggle to differentiate between the different levels of government and are therefore likely to highlight problems that Council is not responsible for but can advocate on. This issue is addressed in more detail in the 'Responsibility for Services and Advocacy' section.

On an unprompted basis, people do not necessarily feel unsafe in their communities. However, upon deeper reflection and consideration of issues holistically, safety and security does present itself as an important concern for residents. Aspects such as increased street lighting and police presence were often mentioned on a prompted basis. This is confirmed in the quantitative results where security and safety is consistently rated as the most important issue for the future of Glen Eira on a considered basis.

DESIRED IMPROVEMENTS CAN BE CLASSIFIED BY DIRECT RESPONSIBILITY &/OR IN NEED OF ADVOCACY EFFORTS

RESIDENTS HOPE THAT A FUTURE GLEN EIRA IS GREEN, VIBRANT AND STILL PROUD OF ITS HERITAGE

Our focus group participants were also asked to look forward 10 to 20 years and try to envision what would need to happen to make **Glen Eira the 'ultimate' place to live**.

The question produced an array of responses, however it is clear that Glen Eira residents are proud of the areas that they live in, and their local communities. Glen Eira residents want to see the character of their neighbourhoods preserved and the quality and number of their parks and open spaces maintained.

Participants want local economies to flourish. For this to happen, they see an **enhancement of their local shopping areas and amenities** so that they don't have to leave Glen Eira to access certain services and facilities. Participants understand that the population is increasing and are hopeful that their local areas will improve simultaneously to cope with the fluctuation in numbers.

Encouraging the use of bicycles and other modes of transport is seen as important by some in this context. They envision a 'bicycle friendly' Glen Eira where it is easier for residents to actively cycle around the municipality. This is a limited view not shared by the broad community who in the main are not cyclists.

The following two slides provide some specific examples of how residents envisage Glen Eira's future.

ASPIRATIONS — WHAT WOULD MAKE GLEN EIRA THE ULTIMATE PLACE TO LIVE?



"Be prouder of our heritage – the beautiful old houses. New, snazzy isn't always the best." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)



"I'd like to ride a bike safely on the road. It's very important because I've given up now."

(Camden Ward, Older)



"What I hope in 20 years' time is that our amenities, our parks and things aren't gradually eaten away and they're improved so that there are toilets and areas for kids to play." (Camden Ward, Older)



"Glen Eira will become an inner city area so we need to protect our parks and our walking paths." (Rosstown Ward, Older)



"Local jobs – should be an office and business zone so people can work locally." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)

ASPIRATIONS — WHAT WOULD MAKE GLEN EIRA THE ULTIMATE PLACE TO LIVE?



"Improve quality of local shops so I don't have to go to Chadstone, Southland – local shops have been replaced by cafes... I like to support my locals." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)



"You want to be able to enjoy the area you live in as much as possible... and make the most of being part of a community, meeting people, being able to recognise people."

(Rosstown Ward, Younger)



"General parklands and green. More bike paths – ones that go for more than a few hundred metres." (Tucker Ward, Younger)



"Events and festivals to accommodate for the higher density of people. Some sort of nightlife attraction." (Tucker Ward, Younger)



"Bike paths, infrastructure to encourage less cars, more sports facilities and more native trees to attract more native birds." (Tucker Ward, Older)



SECURITY AND PUBLIC CONCERNS ARE ENTWINED WITH WIDER SOCIAL ISSUES

All aspects of the research program suggest that **security and public safety is a growing concern for the people of Glen Eira**. Residents perceive the City of Glen Eira to be a safe place to live and concerns centre around a will for that to continue to be the case well into the future.

Anxieties over security and safety are **intertwined with wider issues** such as increases in population through development (this is a tangible change that is bringing about new populations and demographics), as well as issues that are far beyond council control such as the perceived increased threat of terrorism. In this context, **security and safety matters become amplified** to the extent that their importance is projected upwards on a list of issues that are important for the future direction of the Glen Eira.


Given this, residents are becoming more astute and aware of problems associated to security and safety and are more likely to take notice of any media (local or other) that outlines these problems. This ranges from attacks in parks or at stations to inadequate street lighting in a particular area.

Consequently, residents are seeking reassurance from Council (and all levels of government) that their concerns are being heard and that security and public safety is an issue of high priority.

Residents are seeking an outline for how Council is planning to keep Glen Eira safe in the future with clarification on any improvements to specific areas and on what it will advocate to higher levels of government.



RESIDENTS WANT GLEN EIRA TO CONTINUE TO BE A SAFE PLACE TO LIVE

"Put in street lighting to improve safety. Some streets are really poorly lit, even main streets." (Rosstown Ward, Older)

"For me it's a piece of mind thing, they can go out and go clubbing and they can come home with her friends on the tram. It's a safety thing to me to know that there's still an above average standard and safety that they're living in." (Camden Ward, Younger) "I am concerned about the public safety in our community, I know that when I grow up you could walk the streets at night comfortably." (Camden Ward, Older)

"We've had some attacks in Boyd Park through lack of lighting I suppose, gangs sitting there using drugs... I'm very worried about security, especially in the station area." (Rosstown Ward, Older)

"In terms of safety. There's some spots where you can see some hooligans around. Perhaps a centre or somewhere you can educate the young teenagers who might be struggling at school." (Tucker Ward, Younger)

KEY ISSUES FOR THE FUTURE OF GLEN EIRA: A SUMMARY OF THE QUALITATIVE INSIGHTS

The following summarises the most important issues for the future of Glen Eira arising from the qualitative research:

Security/ Safety

- Big concern safety is perceived to have changed
- · Has a direct impact on residents' lives
- · What Council is doing in this area?

Development

- Perception is that overdevelopment is having a major impact on residents quality of life
- Development limited and neighbourhood character and heritage preserved

Community consultation and engagement

- In what ways is Council working with the community to achieve goals?
- Perception is that Council could do more in this area

Traffic congestion and parking

- A major concern is experienced on a day-to-day basis
- Congestion and parking are seen to be getting worse, many are looking to Council to provide solutions to these problems


Transparency and accountability

- An increased focus on Council transparency and accountability
- Council could do better in this area and many are eager to see this covered more prominently in the future Community Plan



SPECULATION REGARDING WHAT THE PLAN ENTAILS LEADS TO THE ASSUMPTION IT IS ABOUT LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Awareness of the Glen Eira Community Plan is negligible amongst our qualitative participants. Glen Eira residents are generally unaware that the Community Plan exists – and the very few that have heard of it can only recall seeing it either at Council offices or mentioned in the Glen Eira newsletter. This suggests there is potential to **raise awareness** of the Plans' existence.

"I think it was on the counter at Glen Eira Council offices."
(Camden Ward, Older)

When asked what they would expect to find in a 'Community Plan', responses are speculative and generally based around the perception that a plan means looking towards the future.

Consequently, people reason that the Community Plan would involve what Council plans to spend its budget on and the vision it has for the community for the coming years. Responses are largely shallow, with people unable to articulate the specifics of what a Community Plan would entail. This indicates a need to communicate to residents what the Community Plan is and how it will impact their communities, as speculation can lead to a misguided perception of what the Plan is.

"Probably what they're going to spend their money on, like a 5 or 10 year plan." (Camden Ward, Younger)

"Probably details on population, amenities and costs." (Rosstown Ward, Older)

WHEN INTRODUCED TO THE PREVIOUS COMMUNITY PLAN, RESPONSES ARE GENERALLY POSITIVE

Participants were **positive about the information** covered in the 2012-2016 Community Plan. Rather, **criticisms tend to centre around the** *way* **in which the information is presented**. People feel that the plan was 'too wordy' and this made the material hard to digest and resulted in disengagement.

Glen Eira residents stress the need for the plan to **be communicated in a succinct and easy to digest manner** as this will keep residents engaged and allow them to absorb important information about the future of their communities.

In terms of theme areas, those in our groups feel that the themes in the 2012-2016 Community Plan **cover most of their concerns** and most are satisfied with these as theme areas. People generally struggle to articulate any area that they think is missing from the plan and are happy with the way in which the plan is broken down. However, residents identify some areas that they would like to see more emphasis on in the upcoming Community Plan. These are discussed on the ensuing slides.

"I think it's a good plan, I just want to know what's been spent and on where." (Camden Ward, Older) "They seem to be aware of the issues – the parking and development issues, open spaces."

(Tucker Ward, Younger)

"Less words, be more specific." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)

RESIDENTS WANT TO SEE MORE DETAIL RELATING TO UPCOMING PROJECTS, INCLUDING ALLOCATION OF BUDGET AND LOCATION OF PROJECTS

In terms of specific information in the Community Plan, Glen Eira residents feel that the **information presented is 'somewhat vague'** and express a desire to see changes in how the Community Plan is presented. Specifically, people would like information on:

- The outline of current and future projects that Council has planned.
- More detail on specific allocation of budget.
- Where relevant, more location specificity in relation to projects.

Whilst this information is available in Council's yearly Action Plan, relatively low awareness of the Community Plan means that people are also unaware of the Action Plan. The detail that is outlined in Council's Action Plan is the information that residents are seeking and increasing awareness of the Action Plan will give residents the opportunity to understand the projects and targets that Council has in place.

"It's lacking examples of things that the Council has done and things that they are doing." (Tucker Ward, Younger)

"Allocation of budget, they don't tell you what you've spent of each individual item, it's about transparency." (Camden Ward, Older) "It doesn't have any dates, like any targets dates or how much it costs." (Camden Ward, Younger)

"I'm a local resident and I don't feel this is relevant to me... I want more specific street names, park names."

(Rosstown Ward, Younger)

INCREASING AWARENESS OF AND INCORPORATING THE YEARLY ACTION PLAN WILL PROVIDE RESIDENTS WITH THE INFORMATION THAT THEY SEEK

Those we spoke with voice a desire for the Community Plan to be **measurable and with some kind of key performance indicators (KPI's)**, as this is perceived to **increase trust and accountability** between the community and Council.

- People want to see goals and timeframes for projects they want Council to make itself more accountable by providing specific goals and timelines.
- The perception is that it is not necessarily about achieving all the goals set forth, rather it is about being able to measure levels of achievement, thus making Council more accountable.
- If goals aren't achieved, people express a desire to see Council communicating where the project is at, why targets weren't met and the steps being taken to achieve the end goal. **This is** perceived to reflect honesty and humility.

Again, given Council's yearly Action Plan contains the information that is sought by residents, this stresses a need to:

- incorporate some of the information in the yearly Action Plan within the Community plan;
 whilst concurrently,
- b) increasing awareness of the Action Plan itself so that residents are aware that the information is available, should they want more detailed information on specific projects and KPI's.

"Come up with things that you're going to do by a certain date then you have some accountability."

(Camden Ward, Younger)

"Accountability is not just collecting the rates and promising, accountability says that we're actually going to do something about it." (Camden Ward, Younger)

"It needs to incorporate accountability – what has been done, achieved in certain areas from previous plan, funding details. It's about communication and building trust – it doesn't have to be really specific (on timing)." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)

"What we want to know is what has been achieved in the previous period and what they plan to achieve in the coming period." (Tucker Ward, Older)

SUMMARY: WAYS TO IMPROVE THE COMMUNITY PLAN

The findings of the research suggest there is scope for the Community Plan to be improved and streamlined through the following means:



Simplifying of language – Long bodies of text and complex language are a deterrent. Keeping language simple and succinct will enable residents to engage with the Community Plan on a deeper level. Residents want to know what Council has planned for the communities but loath to read long and complex documents.



Increase tangibility through project detail – Residents want to know what Council has planned for their specific areas. Providing some clear detail on projects that Council is implementing with outline of specific locations will make the Community Plan more tangible and relevant for residents.




Increase awareness of and incorporate aspects of Council's yearly Action Plan – Much of the information that residents are seeking is contained in the Action Plan. Finding ways to both increase its awareness and incorporating it into the Community Plan will serve to satisfy most of resident's information needs.

Clarity of responsibility for services between levels of government



GLEN EIRA RESIDENTS ARE SEEKING A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING OF THE SERVICES FOR WHICH COUNCIL IS RESPONSIBLE

The services and amenities that Council and other levels of government are responsible for is **not clear to residents**. Frustrations on particular issues results **in blaming for all levels of government**, regardless of who is responsible. Residents seek a clear distinction on the services and amenities that Council is in charge of and the issues on which Council can advocate on residents' behalf to higher levels of government. This will provide residents with a clear understanding on how Council might approach an issue and reduce prospect of Council being blamed for issues that do not fall under its guise.









QUALITATIVELY, PEOPLE WANT TO SEE MORE EMPHASIS ON KEY ISSUES SUCH AS SECURITY/SAFETY, DEVELOPMENT AND TRAFFIC CONGESTION

The themes covered in the previous Community Plan are seen to be **well-directed and encompassing the key issues** facing the Glen Eira community. However, there are a few issues where people want to see some greater emphasis.

Matters concerning **safety and security and development are prominent**. Moreover, problems relating to **traffic congestion and parking** are seen to be directly related to increased development, making this issue also a key area of focus.

"The more they overdevelop the more populated it will be, the worse off everything else will be, the traffic, the parking..." (Camden Ward, Younger)

"Stop the over development. It's just getting too big and too cumbersome and just has flow on effects and problems with traffic and parking." (Camden Ward, Older) "Parking and traffic is increasing as a result of this radical development." (Rosstown Ward, Older)


"It fails to communicate the key concern of this group – safety. It should be more prominently placed with more detail." (Rosstown Ward, Younger)



DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF RESPONDENTS [QUANTITATIVE]










