

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER OVERVIEW

Welcome to our final Quarterly Performance Report for 2019–2020.

The State of Emergency declared on 16 March continues to impact Council services. As a result, there has been several changes to Council services, including closures of some of our facilities and the postponement of several initiatives, events and works.

I would like to reassure you that our current financial position remains sound, however we know there will be a significant impact on our finances as we continue to be impacted by this global pandemic.

Progress worth noting this quarter includes:

- Council endorsement of redevelopment option B of the Carnegie Swim Centre (with the dive pool) to
 progress to concept design. A further phase of consultation was endorsed by Council on 30 June
 and consultation on the concept design is now underway.
- The Bentleigh Laneway Project is now complete with new bin enclosures, lighting and murals to increase the general amenity of the area.
- There have been all-abilities access upgrades completed at Bentleigh Reserve Pavilion, Caulfield Pavilion, Packer Park and McKinnon Reserve.
- Further Reconciliation Action Plan highlights include National Reconciliation Week activities such as an online community event with Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony from Boon Wurrung Foundation.
- Ninety-four per cent of our community indicated they felt safe or very safe when walking in their local area alone during the day, and sixty-four percent felt safe or very safe when walking in their local area alone after dark.
- Detailed design completed for the new park in Aileen Avenue, Caulfield South
- A much higher level of engagement was seen with Council's new website. Analysis tells us that
 people are navigating through the site with more ease and are finding what they want more quickly
 than before.

For those impacted by COVID-19, Council has endorsed a \$7.3 million Response and Recovery Package to provide immediate financial relief to residents, businesses, sporting clubs and community groups. The Package contains a range of financial concessions, including the ability to defer rates without penalty interest, waivers to certain fees, rent relief for Council community tenants and several new grant programs. FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Council's financial position is presently sound, however the impact of COVID-19 on Council's operating result for 2019-20 has been significant. The operating result year-to-date is lower than was anticipated when the annual budget was set however the balance sheet position and the cash position remain favourable.

While Council has always enjoyed a sound financial position, we are already experiencing a detrimental impact on previously reliable income streams as a result of the pandemic. Facility closures, changes to programming, reduced revenue and unanticipated increased expenditure will all have an impact on Council's long-term financial position and liquidity. On 7 April 2020, Council endorsed the 'COVID-19 Response and Recovery Package' which contains a mix of both financial concessions and new initiatives. In the 2019-20 financial year it was resourced through re-prioritisation of existing budgets and the re-allocation of resources (staffing and budgetary) from activities now unable to be progressed due to COVID-19. The value of initiatives is estimated at \$3.4m for 2019-20.

At the end of June 2020, the performance against budget from ordinary activities showed an unfavourable variance of \$7.37 million, due to lower than anticipated income of \$3.99 million and an unfavourable variance in operating expenditure of \$3.38 million. This was mainly due to: lower than anticipated income received for user fees and fines \$5.87 million; adverse variances in - doubtful debts expense (\$3 million), materials and services (\$2.09 million) and depreciation (\$1 million). Favourable items included employee costs \$4.38 million and government grants \$2.82 million.

Council's current asset ratio, a measurement of our financial strength, decreased to 1.27 from 1.40 the previous year. This means for every \$1 of current liability, the Council had \$1.27 in current assets to meet those commitments. The Council remains financially well positioned and the 2019–20 surplus provides further financial flexibility to meet the city's future service and infrastructure funding needs.

The table below details Council's forecast performance based on the Victorian Auditor-General Financial Sustainability Risk Indicators.

At time of writing Council's 2019-20 Annual Financial Report has not been audited so these results are indicative only.






Performance at a glance 2019-20





Applications Received and Decided




Comment: The number of applications received and determined has remained consistent with the previous quarter, active applications continue to be at a sustainable level.

Applications Completed within 60 Statutory Days




Comment: 80% of applications have been determined within the statutory timeframe for this quarter. There has been a drop since the first half of the year however it is still considerably higher than previous years. Glen Eira out performs most other Metropolitan Councils for the percentage of decisions made within statutory timeframes.

Comment: This quarter there has been a reduction in the average statutory days in which a planning decision is made. Glen Eira is proud of these improvements which is providing a vastly quicker planning permit process for our customers.

VCAT Decisions





Trend in Available Housing Stock





Comment: We continue to see the average bedroom numbers per dwelling remain at 3-4 for houses and 1-2 for apartments.


Estimated Value of Planning Permits Lodged





Sports Ground Utilisation







Infringement Notices Issued for Construction Sites








Types of Youth Programs and Attendance

Food Safety Inspections






Immunisation Coverage Against Each Cohort





Library Loans








Recycling Diversion Rate for Kerbside Municipal Waste





Calls Answered and Counter Enquiries











Attendance at Major Events







Bluestone Laneway, Kerb and Channel Renewal Reconstruction Policy

We wanted to hear residents' views about how important it is to preserve the bluestone in laneways and streets in non-heritage areas for the future. Council own and manage bluestone in our road reserves, laneways and kerbs; they are an integral part of the heritage of Glen Eira. Our current policy for managing bluestone renewal - the Street and Laneway Design and Construction Policy 2013 - provides some guidance for the renewal of bluestone. In recent times, our community has expressed some concern with this renewal process. As a result, we developed the draft Bluestone Laneway, Kerb and Channel Reconstruction Policy. The draft Policy applies to the reconstruction of bluestone laneways and kerb and channels in road reserves and aims to better manage and preserve these assets in the future.

- Proposed Classified Tree Local Law Community members are invited to have their say on a
