

Hands Up for Reconciliation Activity Sheet

What you will need

Cardboard Scissors
Pencil or marker Paint
Black marker or pencil

Step one

Using a marker or pencil, trace around your hand. (You may like to trace around different family members hands)

Step two

Cut out the hand tracing with scissors.

Step three

Decorate your cut-out hand with paint on both sides.
Leave to dry.

You can also create a hand print by painting directly onto your palm and printing this on the cardboard and cutting it out.

You could also write your promise for reconciliation.



Step four

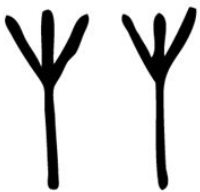
Place your decorated hands in a window facing the street, or on your fence or letterbox. Be careful if it rains.

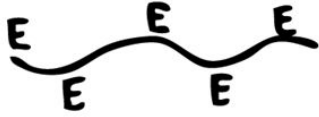

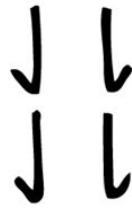

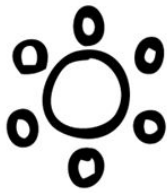


KANGAROO TRACK

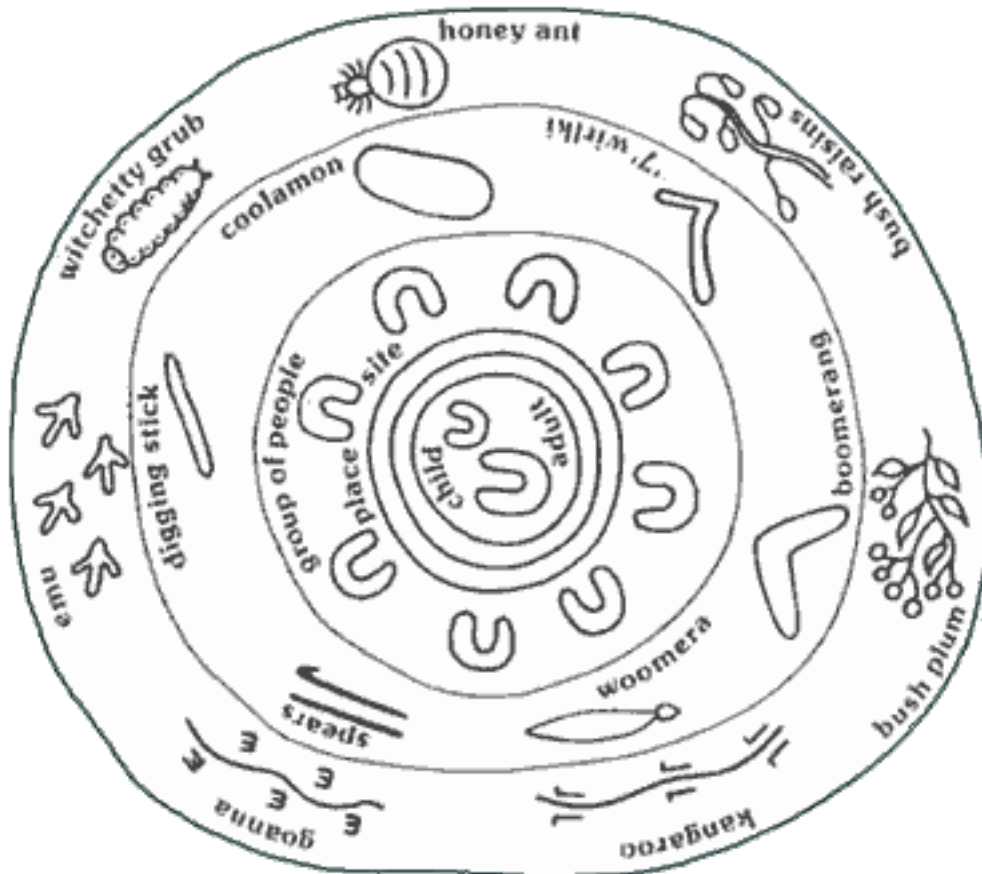
