How to sort recycling

Your yellow bin is for your recyclables, including glass, paper and some plastics. Don't forget to clean the food off pizza boxes and takeaway containers. And make sure to remove the lids of glass jars or plastic bottles before putting them into the yellow bin.

Paper, cardboard and envelopes (as long as they're not shredded)



Newspapers and magazines



Fresh milk or juice cartons (not long-life)



Empty plastic food containers



Empty plastic bottles (bottles only — lids go in your red bin)



Glass jars and bottles (lids and bottles can be recycled, but they need to be separated)



Plastic plant pots (less than 10cm in diameter)

Plastic bags or soft plastics (anything that is plastic and can be scrunched into a ball)



Food or garden waste (this goes in the green bin)



Fabric (this goes in the red bin)



Electronic waste (batteries or electronics)

How to sort rubbish

Your red bin is for general waste — the things that can't be recycled or composted.
